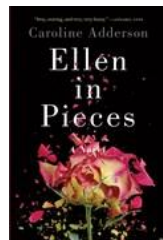


A Russian Sister

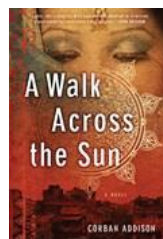

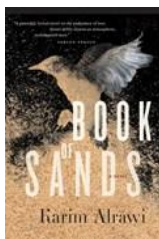

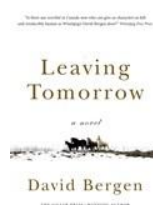


The Broken Hours
